DO YOU REMEMBER THIS?

NEGATIVE ION THERAPY [Watery Snake Oil ??]

If, like I did, you sometimes forgot to pay attention in high-school science class, ions are molecules in the air that have either gained or lost an electrical charge. Tasteless, colorless and invisible, recent controlled studies from Columbia University in NYC have shown that they can affect how we feel.

Positive ions are the bad guys that make you feel drowsy, unmotivated, and depressed. Nothing positive about them at all.

Negative ions, however, reverse those feelings and, when they enter your bloodstream, they produce a bio-chemical reaction that increases the levels of the mood chemical serotonin. They boost your energy, relieve stress, and generally create a more euphoric state.

Those bad positive ions are created by air conditioners, computers, and other grounded

devices in your home, such as TVs, music speakers, washers and dryers, or printers. I know that my lawn produces those nasty positive ions, especially when it's time to mow it. Another source of positive ions are the eaves that need to be painted, and household projects like doing the dishes or taking out the garbage.

On the other hand, negative ions are created when air molecules break apart due to sunlight and moving air and water. Beaches, rivers, waterfalls, see where we're going here? Researchers have found that the major producer of negative ions is splashing water, such as your bow wave, and they surround you when you're out on the water.

But I don't need clinical trials to know that I feel much better when I'm out on my boat!
