
HEAVING TO: The Video

NAUTICAL MILE OR KNOT

C'mon, you remember: one measures distance, the other speed! A nautical mile is based on the circumference of the earth, and is equal to one minute of latitude. It is slightly more than a statute (land measured) mile (1 nautical mile = 1.1508 statute miles). Nautical miles are used for charting and navigating.

A knot is one nautical mile per hour (1 knot = 1.15 miles per hour). The term knot dates from the 17th century, when sailors measured the speed of their ship by using a device called a

"common log." This device was a coil of rope with uniformly spaced knots, attached to a piece of wood shaped like a slice of pie. The piece of wood was lowered from the back of the ship and allowed to float behind it. The line was allowed to pay out freely from the coil as the piece of wood fell behind the ship for a specific amount of time. When the specified time had passed, the line was pulled in and the number of knots on the rope between the ship and the wood were counted. The speed of the ship was said to be the number of knots counted (*Bowditch*).

It's shame that our dinghies are not used more. Sailing a dinghy can be more fun than a keel boat, open north bay to new sailing adventures, and be extremely exciting to sail.

Looking for a new local sailing adventure, pack a picnic lunch, go with a partner, and sail to Sand Island in north bay on a nice sunny day with four to ten knots of wind. Sand Island is a small, low island in north bay. It is very hard to see because it is so low; therefore, it's very hard to find when sailing. To find it, sail north a little east of the middle of the bay when you get north of Bracut you should be able to see it. The island is on the bay chart so you could just use a gps.

The island reminds me of cartoon island where stranded sailors are depicted but without the palm tree. Years ago a group HCY of sailor who called themselves Keels on Wheels (they were all swing keel trailerable boats) would have an annual sail to the island and spend the night there.

If you like adrenaline, try sailing a Laser when the wind is blowing 20 knots with three foot waves, it will be an adrenaline pumping experience, but without proper experience it will be survival sailing just to get back to the dock. If you like that kind of fun, it is worth aspiring to Laser sailing. Hopefully I have wetted your appetite for dinghy sailing. Moreover, dinghy sailing will improve your sailing skills while having fun.
